pectacular and challenging: the Paris 2024 Olympic Games marathon route is revealed.

From Paris to Versailles, and from Versailles to Paris, in the footsteps of the Women's March of 1789, the Paris 2024 Olympic Marathon pays tribute to those who made France the country of human rights and who defended the values of humanity and freedom. These values have guided Paris 2024 every day since the project began.

The route, with its historical foundations, also reflects our constant desire to bring sport to the heart of the city. It combines sporting performance with an exceptional cultural and architectural heritage, and to open the Cames to different territories.

The course will unfold beneath the shoes of the world's leading marathon runners, through the streets and avenues of the most beautiful city in the world. The athletes, the thousands of spectators and millions of television viewers will experience a special line-up of iconic sites, from France's capital to Versailles, through the emblematic landscapes of Ile-de-France. In this exceptional setting, the athletes will also take on a sporting challenge of unprecedented difficulty thanks to a tough course with significant climbs. Paris 2024 can't wait to welcome the world to the starting line on 10 and 11 August 2024!

Tony ESTANGUET Paris 2024 President he unique challenge of the marathon has captured the imagination of runners and fans around the world for more than a century and this will only be enhanced by the creation of a course taking in so much of the history and architectural splendour of Paris, from the Hotel de Ville to Versailles and then on to the finish at the Invalides, running via the bridges of the Seine, the Louvre, the Place de la Concorde and the Eiffel Tour. It is a fitting backdrop for the feats of the world's best marathon runners. In an Olympic first, the organising committee has scheduled the women's marathon as the finale of the athletics programme in Paris to celebrate the march to gender equality in society and in the Olympic Games, a cause that is close to my heart and has long been a key pillar of our sport. This will be a celebration of the marathon and gender equality like no other.

The specific format of the marathon also makes it the most democratic of athletic events, as it gives an almost unlimited number of spectators the chance to cheer on the athletes in person and experience the thrill of Olympic competition without the need for a ticket. The energy of that crowd will be much appreciated by the competitors as they take on a particularly demanding course. Paris will further popularise the marathon by including a mass participation event for the first time, allowing a select group of 40,000 people to run in the footsteps of the champions, either over 10km or the full marathon distance. I'm delighted that there are so many opportunities for people to experience this most symbolic of Olympic events.





THE WOMEN'S MARCH



IN PLOTTING THE ROUTE FOR THE OLYMPIC MARATHON, PARIS 2024 MADE THE BOLD CHOICE TO DRAW INSPIRATION FROM THE 'WOMEN'S MARCH ON VERSAILLES' OF 5 AND 6 OCTOBER 1789 - ONE OF THE SEMINAL EVENTS THAT MADE FRANCE WHAT IT IS TODAY.

The Olympic Marathon finds its inspiration and energy from the women's march, one of the biggest event that has shaped the history and values of contemporary France.

On 5 and 6 October 1789, market traders from Les Halles together with traders and workers from the poorer areas of Paris massed at the Hôtel de Ville of Paris, demanding bread and weapons. Between 6000 and 7000 Parisian women, and a number of men, marched through Paris, eventually making their way to the Château de Versailles and bringing the King and his family to the Tuileries Palace. That day, Louis XVI finally agreed to ratify the Declaration of the Rights of Man and of the Citizen.



The Women's March is among the greatest mass events that have shaped history and the values of France today. Revolutionary and popular, this March is a symbol of the ambition and values behind the Olympic Games Paris 2024.

In 2024, the athletes and participants in the Mass Event Running will follow in the footsteps of their history-making forebears.

WOMEN IN THE PLACE OF HONOUR

The Olympic Games Paris 2024 will honour female athletes, with strict gender parity between the participants: there will be as many women as men taking part in the Games.

In addition, for the first time since the Women's Marathon was added to the Olympic Games schedule in Los Angeles in 1984, Paris 2024 has chosen to reverse the traditional order of the marathons: **the Women's Marathon, on 11 August, the day after the men's event, will be the final and crowning glory of the athletics events**, just hours before the Closing Ceremony of the Olympic Games Paris 2024.



A SPECTACULAR RACECOURSE





As the race follows the route taken by the Women's March of 1789, the Olympic Marathon will take place against the backdrop of Paris' most beautiful monuments, the legendary site of Versailles, and the parks and forests of the surrounding communes.

Paris-Versailles-Paris: the athletes will take part in one of the toughest sporting challenges the celebrates key architectural and historical jewels of France.

Runners will depart from the square in front of the Hôtel de Ville, Paris's city hall. The finish line will be at the Esplanade des Invalides, one of Paris's most iconic open air spaces alongside the river Seine.



"On 1O and 11 August 2024, the myth of the marathon and a legend of the French Revolution will meet. The Games will write a new page in the history of France while sending a powerful message to the world. As part of the first truly gender-balanced Games, our country has chosen to conclude the athletics programme with the women's marathon for the first time ever. And this is even more poignant thanks to the link with the courageous women who marched to Versailles in October 1789 to change history, with France shining a light on the fight for equality between women and men. The course will be one of the most physically demanding. It will also serve as the stage for one of the

most beautiful marathons in the world, thanks to iconic monuments from Versailles to Paris that, for a long time, have dazzled the world. The spectator support along the way promises to be exceptional. Finally, by choosing for the first time a «wide open» Marathon by adding the Mass Event Running, our county proclaims loud and clear that high-level sport must more than ever be a source of inspiration for all generations while driving mass participation. Sport has the power to positively transform society: let us give it every means to do so."

THE OLYMPIC MARATHON, AN ICONIC AND HISTORICAL EVENT

ANCIENT ORIGINS

The Marathon has its origin in a legend from Ancient Greece. In 490 BC, after the Battle of Marathon, the young soldier Philippides was ordered to carry the news of the Athenians' victory over the Persians. He ran the 40km from Marathon to Athens... but died of exhaustion shortly after reaching his goal and announcing the news.

At the end of the 19th Century, which was marked by Hellenism, Pierre de Coubertin decided to include the run from Marathon to Athens on the programme for the first Modern Olympic Games, held in Athens in 1896, to pay homage to the young messenger's sacrifice.

THE OLYMPIC MARATHON THROUGH THE YEARS

- The Marathon was first included as part of the Games in Athens in 1896. However, the women's marathon was not introduced until the Los Angeles 1984 Games.
- The distance for the Olympic Marathon has not always been the same. In Athens in 1896, it was around 40km; in Paris in 1900, it was 40.26km. It was not until the London Games in 1908 that the distance of 42.195 km was set. Since the Paris 1924 Games, the distance has been standardised at 42.195km, and has been used in all Games since then.
- The most decorated Olympic Marathon runners of all time are the Ethiopian Abebe Bikila, the German Waldemar Cierpinski, and the Kenyan Eliud Kipchoge (each with two gold medals).

Some Athletes Who have Made their mark On the event

Abebe Bikila, barefoot runner

At the 1960 Games in Rome, the Ethiopian athlete won the race while running barefoot. He became the first double Olympic champion in the marathon, winning gold in Tokyo in 1964.





Joan Benoit, the first Olympic women's marathon champion

In 1984, at the Los Angeles Games, the marathon was opened to female runners for the first time. The American Joan Benoit took the gold, taking an early lead over the Norwegian Grete Waitz, who was the official world champion, and maintaining it throughout to win by more than a minute.



Alain Mimoun, French legend

Alain Mimoun was the last Frenchman to win Olympic gold in the Marathon, at the Melbourne Games in 1956, beating another legend in the discipline, the Czech runner Emil Zátopek.



Eliud Kipchoge, record holder

The Kenyan athlete is a two-time Olympic Marathon champion, winning gold in Rio 2016 and in Tokyo 2020. On 25 September 2022 in Berlin, he broke his world record setting a new mark of 2:01:09.


